Consultant Speaker on California Women on Corporate Boards Legislation 10:05 – 11:08 Amii Barnard-Bahn CA Resolution SCR 62 CA SB826 State Street Global Advisors CalPERS news article BlackRock	<ul> <li>California Legislation Discussion</li> <li>Senator Lisa Wellman provided some background on Washington Senate Bill 5142, increasing women on corporate boards legislation. Amii Barnard Bahn, coach and consultant who worked on California's law requiring corporations to have a minimum number of women discussed the background of California's law requiring a minimum number of women on corporate boards. <ul> <li>California started with a non-binding resolution in 2013, with a 3-year data collection period.</li> <li>After 3 years, there was a .5% increase in women's representation.</li> <li>The legislation that followed mimicked the language of the resolution but included penalties for non-compliance.</li> <li>The legislation was not intended to drive men out, but to bring qualified women on as men termed out.</li> <li>By the year 2021, there will be a required minimum of 3 female directors.</li> <li>Studies show that 3 is the magic number to enable a group to have collective voice.</li> <li>The legislation effects about 400 corporations headquartered in California</li> </ul> </li> <li>Who were the organized groups against the California legislation as it was being considered?</li> <li>California Chamber of Commerce, individual chambers of commerce, few companies went on record.</li> <li>Women who were already on boards didn't go on record to have concerns.</li> <li>This is not a pipeline problem, it's a process and access issue. Board seats come available quite rarely, it's a closed door process, board members nominate people they already</li> </ul>

There is usually a private matrix list of potential candidates that companies keep to reference when a seat comes available. Companies want a mix of skills.</li> <li>California promoted this as a gender bill not an equality bill and that gender was the largest gap. By disrupting the process it opens the door for diverse candidates.</li> <li>It was bipartisan bill supported by the California Women's Caucus. Amii suggested Washington start a women's caucus.</li> <li>California's Secretary of state agreed to track compliance and is required to publish a report on compliance data.</li> </ul>

Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women & Girls: 11:20 – 11:45 GOIA Director Craig Bill Rep. Debra Lekanoff WSP Report Field Hearing Request Letter	Briefing on issue. How can the Commission help?  The Women's Commission supported 2SHB 1713 last session to help build relationships between Washington State Patrol and tribes to address issues related to missing and murdered indigenous women and girls. The bill also addresses data collection protocols. Michelle also gathered information while in DC about federal legislation to address missing and murdered indigenous women and girls, Savanna's Act. Michelle sent a letter in support of Savanna's Act and in support of holding a field hearing on MMIGW in Yakima. Rep. Lekanoff and Craig Bill discussed some of the data. Craig also gave an overview of the role of tribal police and local law enforcement when conducting investigations of missing persons. When persons go missing on tribal land, it is the jurisdiction of tribal police. Some investigations of serious crimes can go to the FBI or local law enforcement, depending on the agreement between tribe and these agencies.

What would it cost? Senator Billig suggested \$ 1 billion to expand childcare/ early learning. Steve Tammaro said we need to also focus on federal funding for child care. Representative Reeves has been working on expanding child care and passed legislation for Child Care Task Force. Families want a safe environment for their children, and this should be the focus. Being effective and engaging in legislative advocacy: 4:05 – 4:30 Lisa Brown, Ph.D.	<ul> <li>Department of Commerce Director Lisa Brown led a discussion with the commission on being effective and engaging in legislative advocacy.</li> <li>"The Dance of Legislation" book by Eric Redmond: Intersection of policy politics and people. Engage with integrity in the process.</li> <li>In your experience with working with governor appointed bodies what is the most effective way to advance?</li> <li>Always be okay to ask for more but be aware of what is achievable. Okay to operate on two tracks, goal and achievable next steps. Legislative champions are key. Ask hard questions of the decision makers, including the governor, and hold them account able if they say yes. Saying no is also useful to find out what to do to change their mind.</li> <li>Engage key stakeholders who have influence in the process. Such as media, philanthropy, be creative in advocacy.</li> <li>Keep focusing on childcare. Quality early learning is the biggest return on investment. Interrupts intergenerational poverty. Worker productivity issue.</li> <li>Commerce can be a resource for data and contacts.</li> <li>Suggest reaching out to business. Reach out to opponents first.</li> </ul>
