Women's Economic Empowerment campaign launches in Eastern Washington

SPOKANE, WA – Activate 3.8: The Pay Equity Tour aims to close Washington's gender wage gap through policy change, cross-industry partnerships, and by connecting girls to high-paying careers in STEM, trades, and more on a 10-city tour. Following a Seattle launch with Governor Jay Inslee and other leaders last month, the Washington State Women's Commission (WSWC) will bring the campaign to Eastern Washington this Saturday, July 27th, with support from Gonzaga University's Women Lead program and the Girl Scouts of Eastern & Western Washington.
